




# In the uplands, we have a treasure unlike any other in the world.





# Brooks Aqueduct Pheasant Release Site Enhancement Project



The Brooks and District Fish and Game Association (BFGA) is embarking on a habitat enhancement project to plant and irrigate approximately 12,000 trees and shrubs on 20 acres in a portion of the Brooks Aqueduct Site.

The conservation area, which is managed by the BFGA, began as a Buck for Wildlife project that was initiated in the 1970s. The first phase of the project included new ditches with trees and habitat re-established south of the existing parking lot that then extended west and then north to the Brooks Aqueduct trout pond. Subsequently, the second half of the project was completed, which included the 20 acres targeted for enhancement. This water delivery system provided irrigation to the trees and shelterbelts but was discontinued approximately 20 years ago and is no longer usable.

With grant funding a few years ago, the County of

Newell planted new trees south of the parking lot, which the County waters occasionally. Also located within the area is the trout pond. The EID monitors the water level of the pond and adds water in the spring and late fall as necessary. Over the years, there have been many

dedicated and valued volunteers who spend their time and efforts maintaining the conservation area.

This conservation area provides significant ecological value as well as recreational value for the surrounding communities and its members. Located south of the Brooks Aqueduct National and Provincial Historic Site, it also provides visitors to the Brooks Aqueduct recreational opportunities to enjoy in the area.

The area is used year-round for recreational activities. In the summer, folks often canoe, kayak, and fish on the trout pond and walk the beautiful nature trail around the pond. In the winter, ice fishing, skating, snow shoeing, cross county skiing and walking are popular activities. The property is also utilized as a pheasant release site. This project would enhance recreational value of the property, including the hunting experience for the pheasant release and opportunities for bird and wildlife viewing.

The existing trees, shrubs and wetland vegetation provide important habitat areas for many wildlife species. The completion of this habitat enhancement project will provide additional habitat and nesting areas for both game and non-game wildlife including deer, waterfowl, pheasants and songbirds.

For this habitat enhancement project to be successful and continue to provide the value described above, the project objectives include:

- Completion of site surveys
- Completion of preparation work for tree planting
- Installation of a water delivery system to/on property
- Planting of approximately 12,000 trees and shrubs
- Completion of ditch preparation work including repair of existing ditches and construction of new ditches
- Maintain consistent water supply to the site (ongoing)

The BFGA has a long history of involvement in this area and is dedicated to successfully executing this project to preserve and maintain the integrity of this unique conservation area. **Pheasants Forever Calgary** is a committed partner along with the Eastern Irrigation District in this project.

Further funding is being sought.



## Save the Edges!

#### What is Save the Edges!

**Save the Edges** is an awareness campaign highlighting the impact of trespass farming on public roadside ditches and undeveloped right-of-ways. The campaign promotes enhanced protection of these important public lands in southern Alberta, and is made possible by a grant to **Pheasants Forever Canada** from Alberta Environment and Parks.

#### When is this happening?

This is a two-year project beginning in March of 2022.

#### Where will Save the Edges! be focused?

The focus is on southern Alberta municipalities that have had the greatest loss of public roadside ditch and right-of-way habitat including the MD of Acadia, Cypress County, County of Forty Mile, County of Warner, MD of Taber, Lethbridge County, Cardston County, Vulcan County, County of Newell, Wheatland County, MD of Willow Creek, Kneehill County, Starland County and Special Areas 1, 2 and 3.

#### Why it's Important to Save the Edges!

- Wildlife Habitat Many songbirds, small main tals rep iles and upland birds, including pheasants and grey
  partridges, live on the edges. These cries is beauty dependent on the abundance and availability of food
  resources and breeding habit to root dearby natural roadside ditches and right-of-ways. In some areas, these edges
  provide the only available labita
- *Pollinator Habitat and Pes Control* These linear strips of habitat serve as important reservoirs for pollinators, including bees and butterflies. They are also home to many species that play an important role in suppressing populations of agricultural pests.
- Flood Protection Naturally-vegetated roadside ditches play a critical role in slowing, storing and absorbing
  excess water moving across the landscape. Minimizing the speed and amount of overland flooding protects
  municipal roads and culverts, and reduces the erosion of agricultural soils.
- Filtering Excess Nutrients Naturally-vegetated roadside ditches and right-of-ways are important buffers that
  filter excess nutrients, including phosphorous, nitrogen and other chemical products. Without these buffers,
  these nutrients would run unabated into our lakes and rivers, leading to deteriorated water quality.
- Storing Carbon The vegetation and soils in natural roadside ditches and right-of-ways store carbon, providing a
  much-needed public service in the fight against climate change.

#### What will Save the Edges! Accomplish?

It is the goal of this project to provide information that influences landowners and municipalities to reverse the trend of trespass farming, resulting in increased retention of roadside ditches and right-of-ways in their natural state, and the restoration of those previously impacted.


#### **PHEASANT ART**



This plate was created for the *Illustrations of British Ornithology*.

It was illustrated by Prideaux John Selby, an English naturalist born in 1788. He is considered the Audubon of England compiling a set of illustrations of every bird found in the British Isles, drawn life-size. Selby drew and water colored all of his birds and with the assistance of his brother-in-law, Captain Mitford who etched most of the plates and taught Selby the art of etching.
